Our agency serves one in four Alameda County residents, totaling over 405,000 people. We work collectively and in partnership with over 150 organizations to serve the needs of the community.











Child Welfare August 2017


CalWORKs

The California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) Program provides time-limited cash aid, employment and employment support services to eligible adults with children.




CalFresh August 2017


CalFresh (formerly known as Food Stamps) is California's version of the Federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). The CalFresh Program helps to improve the health and well-being of qualified households and individuals by providing them a means to meet their nutritional needs.




Medi-Cal (MC) provides coverage for comprehensive medical services for low-income children, families, seniors, and persons with disabilities.




General Assistance (GA) provides cash aid to indigent adults and emancipated minors who are legal residents of Alameda County and who have no other means of support.




Alameda County Division of Adult Protection (DAP) consists of Adult Protective Services (APS), Office of the Public Guardian-Conservator (PG/PC), and the Public Administrator's Office (PA). Together these programs provide a continuum of services that form a safety net for vulnerable adults.



IHSS provides homecare for the elderly and persons with disabilities to support them in their own homes and communities, rather than placing them in more restrictive and expensive institutional care settings.



The Alameda County Area Agency on Aging (AAA) prevents isolation, premature institutionalization, abuse, and negative health outcomes for seniors. In partnership with County-based adult services programs and a wide network of community-based organizations, the AAA provides a continuum of care that is both responsive to seniors' needs and flexible in design.



Access to Nutritious Food

Congregate and Home Delivered Meals provide meals to Alameda County Seniors who cannot prepare or obtain nutritionally adequate meals for themselves. These meals assist clients in maintaining a nutritious diet.
