

To promote the economic and social well-being of individuals, families, neighborhoods and communities.

Our agency is comprised of over 2,400 individuals working collectively and in partnership with community based organizations to serve the needs of the community.




Child Welfare Children and Non-Minor Dependent Youth in Cases




Child Welfare Children and Non-Minor Dependent Out-Of-Home Placements



AB 12: Child Welfare Non-Minor Dependent Youth 18+ in Placement by Placement Type






Child Welfare Children 0 - 17 in Placement by Placement Type





The California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CaIWORKs) Program provides time-limited cash aid, employment and employment support services to eligible adults with children.





Transitional Housing Program for Non-Minor Dependents in extended foster care	Transitional Housing Program for Non-Minor Dependents in extended foster care
SILP	Supervised Independent Living Placement
Guardian Home	Placement with court appointed legal guardian
Relative/NREFM	Relative / Non Relative Extended Family Member
Group Home	24-Hour staffed residential and/or treatment facility for foster youth
Foster Family Agency	An agency that provides foster homes through a network of providers they supervise; licensed through Community Care Licensing
Foster Family Home	County sponsored foster care home
<u>CalWORKs</u>	
Two Parent Families	Families with children living in the home with two non-disabled, natural or adoptive parents
Non-Needy Caretaker	Families with children living in the home whose natural or adoptive parents are ineligible or excluded from receiving assistance.
TANF Timed-Out	Families with children living in the home whose parents are ineligible for receiving assistance because an adult head-of-household or spouse of a head-of-household has received Federal TANF assistance for a total of 48 cumulative months
Child Only	Families with children living in the home whose parents are ineligible for receiving assistance
Total clients in Welfare to Work	All active CalWORKs adults who have been registered into the Welfare to Work (WTW) program. WTW is the mandatory employment and training program for CalWORKs adults. Clients must register for WTW unless exempted for a condition that prevents them from working. Not all registered WTW clients are actively engaged in the program, as they may be scheduled for activities that have not yet begun, between activities, or non-compliant prior to sanction.
Supported work & community experience	Includes public or private sector employment, under the close supervision of the activity provider, that helps provide basic job skills, and can help lead to eventual unsubsidized employment.
Paying jobs	Includes unsubsidized and subsidized self-employment, public and private sector jobs

Non Assistance CalFresh Individuals	Client receives CalFresh assistance but does not receive a monthly cash grant under the California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) program or other state-funded program
All CalFresh Individuals	All clients receiving CalFresh
Non Assistance CalFresh Caseloads	A CalFresh case in which none or less than all household members receives public assistance (e.g. cash benefit through CalWORKs).
All CalFresh Caseloads	All cases receiving CalFresh
