
# MONTHLY REPORT JUNE 2023





Child Welfare Children 0 - 17 in Placement by Placement Type













The California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) Program provides time-limited cash aid, employment assistance and employment support services to eligible adults with children. Welfare to Work (WTW) is the mandatory employment and training program for CalWORKs adults. Clients must register for WTW unless exempted for a condition that prevents them from working.

#### **CalWORKs Individuals by Case Type**














CalFresh (formerly known as Food Stamps) is California's version of the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). The CalFresh program helps to improve the health and well-being of qualified households and individuals by providing them a means to meet their nutritional needs. Non-Assistance CalFresh individuals do not receive a monthly cash grant under CalWORKs (California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids).





#### Medi-Cal Individuals














General Assistance (GA) provides cash aid to adults and emancipated minors who are legal residents of Alameda County and who have no other means of financial support.


#### **Access to Nutritious Food**

# **Definition of Terms**

#### **CalWORKs**

**Two Parent Families:** Families with children living in the home with two non-disabled, natural or adoptive parents.

**Safety Net:** Families with children living in the home whose natural or adoptive parents are ineligible or excluded from receiving assistance.

**Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Timed-Out:** Families with children living in the home whose parents are ineligible to receive assistance because an adult head-of-household or spouse of a head-of-household has received federal TANF assistance for a total of 48 cumulative months.

**Child-Only (Zero Parent):** Families with children living in the home whose parents are ineligible to receive assistance.

**Total Clients in Welfare to Work:** All active CalWORKs adults who have been registered into the Welfare to Work (WTW) program. WTW is the mandatory employment and training program for CalWORKs adults. Clients must register for WTW unless exempted for a condition that prevents them from working. Not all registered WTW clients are actively engaged in the program, as they may be scheduled for activities that have not yet begun, between activities, or non-compliant prior to sanction.

**Subsidized Work and Community Experience:** Includes public or private sector employment under the close supervision of the activity provider that helps provide basic job skills and can help lead to eventual unsubsidized employment.

**Paying Jobs:** Includes unsubsidized and subsidized, public and private sector jobs and self-employment.

#### **CalFresh**

**Non-Assistance CalFresh Individuals:** Client receives CalFresh assistance but does not receive a monthly cash grant under the California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) program or other state-funded program.

All CalFresh Individuals: All clients receiving CalFresh.

**Non-Assistance CalFresh Caseloads:** Non-Assistance CalFresh recipients are those who get CalFresh each month, but do not receive a monthly cash grant under the California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) program.

All CalFresh Caseloads: All cases receiving CalFresh.

#### **Child Welfare**

Non-Minor Dependents: Youth ages 18-20 in Extended Foster Care under AB12.

**SILP:** Supervised Independent Living Placement.

**Guardian Home:** Placement with court-appointed legal guardian.

Relative/NREFM: Relative/Non-Relative Extended Family Member.

**Group Home:** 24-Hour staffed residential and/or treatment facility for foster youth.

Foster Family Home: County licensed foster care home.

Foster Family Agency Home: Foster home certified by a Foster Family Agency.

**STRTP**: Short Term Residential Therapeutic Program.

**THP+FC:** Transitional Housing Program plus Foster Care, which provides supportive housing for older teens and non-minor dependents.

#### **Child Care**

**CalWORKs Stage One:** Supports a family's access to immediate and continuous child care as parents/caregivers participate in their welfare-to-work activities.

**California Alternative Payment Program (CAPP):** Provides child care to low to moderate income families. Families must be working, enrolled in training towards a vocational goal, physically or mentally incapacitated, or seeking employment.

**Foster Care Child Care Allowance Program (FCCCAP):** Provides a time limited "bridge" to longer term child care solutions. The program is used at the time of placement to stabilize children in the best possible setting.

**Single Parent**: Sole parent/caretaker who lives with and is legally/financially responsible for the child.

**Licensed Family Child Care (FCC):** A business which provides child care in an individual's private home. FCCs vary widely from a home that can care for a few children up to a large family child care home that cares for up to 14 children.

Center-Based Program (also known as "Child Care Center" or "Day Care Center"): Any child care facility of any capacity, other than a family child care home as defined in Education Code Section 102352f.(1).

**License-Exempt:** Child care providers who can operate legally without a license.
