PG&E Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS)

What is PSPS?

Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) occur in response to severe weather conditions. During a PSPS power is turned off by PG&E to help prevent wildfires and keep communities safe these are planned events.

June marks the beginning of wildfire season and can run through late October or November or November in Northern California.

A power shutoff may:

- Cause food spoilage and contamination of water
- Prevent the use of medical devices
- Disrupt operations and delivery of services at Alameda County Social Services Agency's (SSA) offices.

PG&E's Role:



Forecasts for severe weather conditions before power shut off.



Notifications informing customers of potential power shut off to prevent prevent wildfires.



Updates of power restoration.

SSA's Role:

The SSA Office of Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management (DPEM) (DPEM) monitors planned PG&E outages and coordinates needed mass care and shelter services with partners. Examples include supporting with emergency food and water distribution sites and family resource centers.

SSA

- Ensures older adults and individuals with disabilities are safe and have access to needed resources/medical devices during a power shutoff.
- Alerts managers immediately when outages occur in our facilities. Management will provide guidance if staff need to remain on standby or temporarily report to another site.
